During the month of September 2019 the Police Department logged 839 events. We assisted the Fire Department on 53 medicals and 19 other Fire Department related calls. Here are some of the highlights:

Along with Dr. Mary Malone, I attended the Middlesex County DA's Superintendents and Chiefs Breakfast held annually at UTEC in Lowell. UTEC is an organization that seeks to ignite and nurture the ambition of disconnected youth and show them a path to economic independence. They cook a fantastic breakfast and I'm not sure if we attend for that or to get updates from DA Ryan on her many initiatives.

I joined the Nashoba Valley Chamber of Commerce at its season kickoff of Breakfast with the Boss on the 12th. Keynote speaker was Governor Baker who updated us on topics of interest to the business community as well as fielding questions from the audience.

Gage Cannabis opened for business on the 23rd. Though we were prepared for the worst, the magnitude of patrons seen at earlier openings of Retail Cannabis shops did not materialize here in Ayer and no other issues have been reported.

A Steering Committee, which I am sitting on, has been formed by Pepperell Police Chief Scott, on behalf of our COIN Collaborative, to train our 10 area town's officers on a Crisis Intervention Team program. The goal of CIT is to take an alternative, community based approach in dealing with victims of mental illness and their families. The Steering Community will be devising the training and its planned roll out in the months to come.

In total the Department spent 113 hours in training for the month.
